Dr. Nevalon Mitchell, Jr. was born in Wilson, NC. He holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Sociology, a minor in Psychology, and a Basic Intensive in Philosophy from the University of Michigan-Flint. He also has a Master of Divinity Degree from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, IL, where his particular emphasis was on "The Church and The Black Experience," and a Doctor of Ministry Degree from the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Louisville, KY, where his Doctoral Thesis was "Black Preaching and The Black Church: Tradition Viewed in the Context of Liberation Theology." Dr. Mitchell holds a Ph.D. in Church History and Biblical Studies from the Newburg Theological Seminary in Newburg, IN.

Dr. Mitchell is licensed and ordained in The National Baptist Convention USA, Inc. In 1978, Dr. Mitchell entered the United States Army. He served in Vietnam from March 1967 until January 1968. After graduating from college and seminary, he re-entered active duty as a Chaplain in March 1978 and retired from the United States Army as a Lieutenant Colonel in July 2000. Dr. Mitchell holds a life membership with The Disabled American Veterans, The American Legion, and The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. He retired from The Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Healthcare System on October 31, 2017, as a Senior Chaplain Clinician, and was credited with preventing eleven suicides.

Dr. Mitchell is married to Wessylyne Kaye Mitchell, and they are the proud parents of four adult children, seven adorable grandchildren, and two Godchildren. Dr. Mitchell is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Taylor Thomas is a well-known and respected Radio and Television News Journalist. She has graced the DC Metropolitan airwaves as the Morning News Anchor for The Steve Harvey Morning Show and The Russ Parr Morning Show.

Taylor has spent two decades as a public figure partnering with community outreach efforts and covering stories that impact communities here in the DMV, from the DC Sniper, 911 to the election of the nations first Black President Barack Obama. Taylor is committed to working with our youth, which prompted her to create a 501c3 nonprofit organization, The Better Family, Inc., in 2012. The Better Family, Inc., connects children with educational and career resources. Thomas has dedicated her life to uplifting and educating others about health, money, and social issues.



Living Legend



Paris Davis was born in 1939, in Cleveland, Ohio. As a young man, he became interested in the military and sports, and he pursued both at Southern University, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, where he studied political science on an ROTC scholarship.

Davis was commissioned as an Army reserve armor officer in 1959, graduated from Airborne and Ranger schools in 1960, and was selected for the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1st Special Forces, serving first in Korea and then Vietnam.

Davis first deployed to Vietnam in 1962 and again in 1965, where he was promoted to captain as a detachment commander with the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1st Special Forces making him one of the first African American Special Forces officers as the civil rights movement gained momentum at home.

Although Davis was known throughout the Army as a modern-day hero, his daughter shared that growing up, he never talked about the war, and she didn't find out the extent of his valor until 2019 when he was inducted into the Ranger Hall of Fame.

"That's when I looked through his book for the first time and saw what he did," she said. "His selflessness, putting others before himself, the struggle of going back once, twice, three times to save his men. Never thinking for a second that he would leave anyone behind."

Davis' Medal of Honor paperwork had been lost twice, resulting in this honor being postponed 56 years after his initial nomination. (ABC News)

"...nearly 20 hours later — after that bugle first rang, Captain Davis saved — had saved each one of his fellow Americans. Every single one. Just as the story of Paris Davis did not begin on June 18th, 1965, it does not end there either. Captain Davis went on to become Colonel Davis, serving more than 25 years in our military and earning a PhD on top of that. He received the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal, the Purple Heart. And even after he hung up his uniform, the Colonel continued to serve the community, founding the Metro-Herald, a newspaper that focused on his local community and civil rights issues."

Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing - often called "The Black National Anthem" was written as a poem by James Weldon Johnson and then set to music by his brother John Rosamond Johnson in 1899. It was first performed in public in the Johnsons' hometown of Jacksonville, Florida, as part of a celebration of Lincoln's Birthday on February 12, 1900, by a choir of 500 schoolchildren at the segregated Stanton School, where James Weldon Johnson was principal.
